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2 Introduction

2.1 Baseline Data Report (BDR)

The Baseline Data Report 2019-2020 (BDR) is the eighteenth volume of a series produced by the Community Health and Social Services Network (CHSSN) to serve as a relevant and comprehensive knowledge base regarding the situation of Québec's English-speaking population in the area of health.

The Baseline Data Report series is intended to serve as a resource that will allow local communities to better understand the demographic factors and health determinants affecting them and to assist institutional partners and community leaders in developing strategies to improve the well-being of their constituencies.

The Baseline Data Report 2019-2020 presents, in a time series, two determinants of health that impact English-speaking Québecers, namely, access to the health and social services system and language of access.

2.2 About this Report

The 2019-2020 Baseline Data Report (BDR) relays the health and social service findings of the CHSSN/CROP¹ provincial survey of English speakers conducted in 2005, 2010, 2015 and 2019. This report is the first in the Baseline Data Report series to present the CHSSN/CROP provincial survey results from four different time periods.

In keeping with the standard CHSSN reporting approach, survey results are organized according to the location of respondents in regional communities across Québec's administrative territory and delineated into sub-groups defined by gender, age, household income, and knowledge of English and French. For report graphs, CHSSN selected two population groups considered vulnerable by many stakeholders with respect to access and language of service due to their age and level of bilingualism.

It should be noted that in 2019, the CHSSN provincial survey questionnaire was significantly modified and the title of the survey changed to *Community Health and Social Survey* to reflect an increased focus on health sector issues. Importantly, despite these changes a sizable number of questions have remained identical and nearly identical across each rendition of the questionnaire. The responses to the questions that reoccurr from 2005 through to 2019 form the basis of these profiles. Information on health and social services access among English-speaking communities gathered through sampling techniques other than CROP telephone interviews are not included.

2.3 Methodology

For the 2019-2020 Time Series BDR, the differences and similarities between surveys in terms of questionnaire design, sampling techniques, data treatment and reporting style were given careful consideration.

2.3.1 Questionnaire Design

For the purpose of observing survey results over time, the questionnaires for each year were compared and the identical or nearly identical questions among the four years were selected for reporting. To view the list of questions selected for reporting go to Appendix 1.

2.3.2 Sampling Techniques

Telephone Survey – In every version of the survey, the main sampling technique used by CROP has been telephone interviews. In each of the four years included in this report English-speaking Québecers aged 18 and over around the province were randomly selected for interviews over the telephone. Data collection for the interviews generally lasted eight to ten weeks in the period between February and the end of June. The number and key socio-demographic characteristics (unweighted) of the English-speaking respondents for 2005, 2010, 2015 and 2019 are presented below.

Focus Groups and Online Survey – In 2015, four focus groups were added to CHSSN survey techniques due to a low response rate to telephone interviews in certain regions. The four regions addressed through focus groups were Chaudiere-Appalaches, Cote-Nord (middle and upper parts), Abitibi-Temiscamingue and Bas-Saint-Laurent. In 2019 the low response rate to telephone interviews in six health regions was addressed through focus group and online survey techniques. The six regions were Saguenay-Lac-St-Jean, Côte-Nord (middle and upper parts), Gaspésie-Les Îles (Magdalen Islands), Chaudière-Appalaches, Centre-du-Québec and Abitibi-Témiscamingue. In the 2015 and 2019 BDRs the focus group and online survey findings are tabulated and reported separately from the telephone interview results. The findings from focus groups and online surveys are not included in this time series report.

2.3.3 Data Treatment

Geographic Regions – The fourteen regions addressed in the tables and graphs of this time series report are drawn from Québec's 22 RTS (réseau territorial de services) territories. Some regions are not profiled due to small sample size. RTS de la Montérégie-Est is reported as an individual region in Table 2.6 only. The correspondence between Québec's 18 Health regions and its Integrated Health and Social Service Centers (CISSS) and Integrated Center for University Health and Social Services (CIUSSS) after the adoption of Law 10 is available at the following link: https://www.msss.gouv.gc.ca/professionnels/informations-geographiques-et-de-population/decoupage-territorial/

Percentages – The majority of tables in this report present results in the form of percentages. Non-responses (no answer, did not know, etc.) have been excluded from the totals prior to calculation of percentages.

Weighted – Data has been weighted according to region (by CLSC), age, and gender using data from the Statistics Canada 2016 Census.

2.4 Reporting: Table and Graph Explanation

Table Headings

In this report the responses to each survey question are presented in the form of a table and accompanying graph. The title of the table captures the survey question being answered as well as the RTS region in which the respondents are located. In the accompanying example, the table presents the responses of all those residing in Gaspesie who used the services of a CLSC in the prior twelve months. The full question is "In the last twelve months, in your region, have you used the services of a CLSC for yourself or to help another person?". Appendix 1 of this document may be consulted for a list of the CROP interview questions reported by the tables and graphs.

Column and Row Headings

Rows

The responses in the table are further delineated by four variables: **gender**, **age**, **household income and knowledge of French and English** as indicated by the row headings. In this example, the proportion of respondents who used the services of a CLSC in the past twelve months is indicated for each variable and survey year by the given percentage. Percentages are not reported where fewer than 10 respondents would be indicated. The total number of respondents who answered a particular question is given beneath each percentage in the form **(n=)**.


The total number of respondents for a given survey period and RTS or provincial territory is provided in the row entitled **Total** at the bottom of the table. For example, the table above shows that a total of 162 Gaspésians answered the question on the use of CLSC services in the past 12 months. Of these, 45.3% answered "yes" to the question. Among the variables, the table also reveals that 70 male Gaspésians answered this question with 51.8% of them answering "yes".

Columns

The data is presented in two main blocks: one for the region under study (RTS Gaspésie in the table above) and the other for the English-speaking provincial total (weighted data for all English-speaking respondents).

Within each block, data is presented for the four survey years: **2005/2010/2015/2019**. In this example, in 2005, 39.6% of female Gaspésie respondents had used the services of a CLSC compared to 47.2% of the total female English-speaking sample of the same year. The same table tells us that in 2010, 58.6% of female Gaspésie respondents had used the services of a CLSC compared to 52.5% of the total female English-speaking sample of the same year.

Graphs



In the graph above, the solid line presents the percentage of English speakers in the Gaspésie who used the services of a CLSC in 2005, 2010, 2015 and 2019. Points on the line are not shown for years where the number of respondents to the given question was too low to report. In this example, 45.3% of Gaspésians used CLSC services in 2005, 59.2% used these services in 2010, 53.4% used these services in 2015 and 43.5% used CLSC services in 2019.

The dotted line presents the findings for the four survey years for all English-speaking survey respondents across Québec who said "yes" they had used the services of a CLSC.

2.5 Size and Proportion of English-speaking Population, by Health Region, 2001-2016

The accompanying table surveys the size and proportion of the English-speaking population comparing 2001, 2006, 2011 and 2016. The greater Montréal region (including Laval and Montérégie) experienced solid growth over the past 10 years as did Nord-du-Québec. Most other regions experienced either modest growth or may even have declined in numbers and percentage over this period.






3.3.3 Felt Service at CLSCs in English was Very Important – Graphs








3.6.3 Felt Service in English During Overnight Stay at a Hospital was Very Important – Graphs

3.8.1 Expected to Require Public Long-Term Care Institutions in the Next Five Years – Graphs






3.8.2 Felt Service in English at a Public Long-Term Care Institution was Very Important – Graphs





3.9.1 Expected to Require a Public Homecare Program in the Next Five Years – Graphs






3.11.1 Expected to Require Private Nursing Services at Home or Private Homecare in the Next Five Years – Graphs












3.15 Provided Unpaid Care for a Vulnerable or Dependent Person – Graphs






