#### **Definitions and Concepts**

<u>First Official Language Spoken (FOLS)</u> The definitions of first official language spoken and official language minority are outlined in the Official Languages (Communications with and Services to the Public) Regulations issued pursuant to the Official Languages Act (1988). The official language minority is English in Quebec and French in all other provinces and territories. First Official Language Spoken is derived from the census questions on knowledge of official languages, mother tongue and home language. Multiple responses are distributed equally among declared languages.

**National Household Survey Variables** 

<u>Census Family households</u> are those with a married couple (with or without children), or a couple living common-law (with or without children), or a lone parent living with one or more children (lone-parent family).

<u>Educational Attainment</u> – Persons with low educational attainment are those with only a high school graduation certificate or less while those with high educational attainment are those with a university bachelor's degree or higher.

<u>Income</u> – Persons with low income are those with individual income less than \$20k while those with high income reported \$50k or more. This includes income from all sources.

<u>LICO</u> uses the income levels of a given family and considers how large a share of its income is spent on necessities such as food, shelter and clothing. If the amount a family spends is 20% higher than an average family in a year, it falls into the low income cut-off category. People who live below income cut-offs may be said to live in "straitened circumstances." (Human Resources and Skills Development Canada, August 2009.)

<u>Mobility status</u> – (Place of residence 5 years ago) Refers to the status of a person with regard to the place of residence on the reference day, May 10, 2011, in relation to the place of residence on the same date five years earlier.

Persons who have not moved are referred to as non-movers and persons who have moved from one residence to another are referred to as movers.

Movers include non-migrants and migrants.


Non-migrants are persons who did move but remained in the same city, town, township, village or Indian reserve.

Migrants include internal migrants who moved to a different city, town, township, village or Indian reserve within Canada.

External migrants include persons who lived outside Canada at the earlier reference date. External migrants are referred to as immigrants in this document.




#### **Laval CLSCs Compared to BMLs (Approximation)**






#### **Number of English Speakers**



- In 2016, there were a substantial 91,115 Englishspeaking individuals living in the Laval region.
- They are distributed across four CLSC territories with the greatest concentrations located in Chomedey and Sainte-Rose-de-Laval.



#### **Proportion of English Speakers**



- In 2016, the English-speaking population of Quebec formed 13.8% of the total Quebec population.
- In Laval, English speakers formed 22.2% of the total regional population.



## Deprivation Index and Developmental Delay among Quebec's Young Children by School System


#### **Students by Deprivation Index and Language of School**


# Kindergarten Children Experiencing a Developmental Delay in at Least One Domain, by School Board, French-language System, 2017


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#### **Vulnerable Children by Domain and School Board**





## Living Arrangements: Lone parent families in Laval


#### **Total Population in Lone Parent Families**

 single parent households.




#### **English-speaking Lone Parent Families by Gender**



- In 2016 in Quebec's Englishspeaking communities, there was a greater tendency for females to be living in lone parent families compared to males.
- In the Laval region and in all four CLSC territories, there are more English-speaking females living in lone parent families than Englishspeaking males.

 The greatest proportion of children 0-5 living in a lone parent household for both the French and English language communities of Laval are located in CLSC Pont-Viau.



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
#### **Recent Immigrants Among Adults 25 to 44**








#### **Low Income Among Adults 25 to 44**



- In 2016, there were high levels of low income among Quebec's English speakers aged 25 to 44.
- In the Laval region, 28.8% of English speakers aged 25 to 44 were living on an annual income under \$20,000.



#### **High Income Among Adults 25 to 44**



Official Language Spoken with multiple responses distributed equally.

- In 2016, the tendency to be earning over \$50,000 was lower among Quebec Anglophones aged 25 to 44 compared to Francophones of the same age.
- In Laval, this holds true although the gap between the minority (35.2%) and majority group (38.4%) is somewhat smaller.

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

#### Children 0 to 5 Below LICO



- Provincially, English-speaking children aged 0-5 are more likely to be living below the low income cut-off (LICO) compared to Francophone children of the same age.
- In Laval, the tendency of children 0-5 to be living below LICO varies across CLSC territories for both language communities.
