


### Manifesto

The Cote des Neiges Black Community Association (CDNBCA) in operation for 48 years has served the English-speaking black community by offering programs and services primarily for youth, families, and seniors. For the last fifteen years, the organization has offered a UNESCO recognized best-practice prevention program adapted for black families, the Strengthening Black Families Program. This program has served over 650 families in Montreal and is currently funded to offer twelve sessions annually in different boroughs to high-risk families. Currently, CDNBCA serves predominately English-speaking, visible minority and newly arrived families which is reflective of the diversity of Cote des Neiges-Notre Dame de Grace and surrounding areas.



The Federation of Black Canadians is a national, non-profit organization, driven by organizations across the country that advances the social, economic, political and cultural interests of Canadians of African descent.

As a Pan-Canadian body, the FBC seeks to discuss the opportunities, contributions and challenges that exist for people of African descent nationally.





REALITIES OF BLACK CANADIANS AND OTHER MARGINALIZED COMMUNITIES AROUND COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic has only heightened the challenges already faced by marginalized and racialized communities across Canada. The Black community has been affected more than most, with systemic anti-Black racism profoundly impacting equitable access to food, education, healthcare services, housing, and economic resources.

As was expected, recent surveys and government data have shown that Black people in various Canadian cities are disproportionately infected with, and impacted by COVID-19. And yet, not everyone sees the importance of collecting race based data.

Many other racialized and marginalized communities across Canada are also disproportionately affected by COVID-19. The lack of community relevant raced-based data in Canada is upholding systemic inequities within our society, and needs to change.

#### National data collection platform

The collection and reporting of race-based data during this pandemic is a critical component in understanding and addressing anti-black racism in Canada and the impacts of inequality on all racialized groups in Canada. We cannot address what is not being measured, and it is past time for Canadians to have an honest look at the state of race in our nation and to relinquish the notion of colorblindness. We recognize the importance of collecting race-based data and immediately implementing a mechanism to address the inefficiencies and inequities heightened by COVID-19.

The purpose of this platform is to use race-based data collection, analysis and public reporting to:

- ☐ Give a voice to racialized and marginalized communities.
- □ Identify, monitor and eliminate potential systemic racism and racial bias.
- □ Advance the delivery of services/ programs that ensure the fair treatment of every person by supporting the development of equitable policies, procedures, services and initiatives.
- □ Preserve the dignity of individuals and communities.




#### SOCIO-ECONOMIC PANDEMIC POSING AS A HEALTH PANDEMIC



#### **PRIVACY & SECURITY**

All our user information are encrypted using OpenSSL and the AES-256-CBC cipher.

AES 256 is virtually impenetrable using brute-force methods. While a 56-bit DES key can be cracked in less than a day, AES would take billions of years to break using current computing technology.




### ENGAGING THE PROBLEM OF RACIAL INJUSTICE THROUGH RESEARCH

Efficient Social Justice: How Critical Race Theory Research can Inform Social Movement Strategy Development (Johnson-Ahorlu, 2017)

Data that CRT research generates can be very useful to activists and organization as they move forward in making the best decisions and building strong defense or offense in achieving social justice;

Recognizes structural inequities and must not utilize political or social constructs that marginalize people of colour.



#### PROJECT METHODOLOGY

This partnership seeks to empower BIPOC & Marginalized community organizations to obtain their own sources of data necessary to support policy development in a race equity response to COVID-19.

This response needs to be rooted in a meaningful analysis guided by input and direction from the Marginalized community in order to prevent further exacerbation of oppression and systemic inequality.

The findings from this needs assessment will allow for the development of a strategic plan for building the capacity and resiliency for both organizations to respond to the short, medium and long-term needs of their community.

Thus, this partnership builds community capacity by improving the ability for CDNBCA to address the Socio-Economic determinants of health of the Marginalized populations in Canada.

#### PROJECT METHODOLOGY

Collect race and other demographic data in relation to COVID-19 through remote surveys

Conduct key information interviews with Black community organizers

Dissemination and engagement;

#### STAGES OF STRATEGY DEVELOPMENT

**DEMANDS**: Use research findings to inform an understanding of what contributes to the problem at-hand, what is needed to eradicate it, and create goals accordingly;

ARENA: Use research findings to support development of a communications plan to relay experiences of the Black community and to inform the development of a response to the issue

**TACTICS**: Use the recommendation, informed by the research to develop actions or intervention to address the issue. Mobilize knowledge.



### DO YOU HAVE A FAMILY MEMBER OR LOVED ONE THAT HAS PASSED AWAY FROM COVID-19






#### HAVE YOU EXPERIENCED DISCRIMINATION DURING COVID-19 PANDEMIC?


### HAVE YOU OR ANYONE YOU LOVED EXPERIENCED OVER-POLICING DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC?


