#### **Brief presentation about the RVP**

National grouping recognised and financed by the Ministry of the Family = 250 members from all regions of Quebec

- 1) Integration of fathers in public policies (PAMSBEH, Stratégie Égalité, actions of the Ministère de la Famille, etc.)
- 2) Integration of fathers in the family service offer
  - a) Programme d'adaptation des pratiques aux réalités paternelles (PAPPa): training, coaching, creation of tools, etc;
  - b) Major projects: immigrant fathers, fathers with disabled children, training for fathers and perinatal care, prevention of domestic violence, family-work balance, etc.
- 3) Production of studies and social campaigns (Semaine Québécoise de la Paternité)

#### **RVP-CHSSN** partnerships for the past 5 years

- a) Translation of material
  - -Quebec Fatherhood Week
  - -Training and tools for the Programme d'adaptation des pratiques aux réalités paternelles (PAPPa)
- **b) Translation of other tools** 
  - -Coparentality (phase 1 and phase 2)
  - -Approach for intervention with men
- c) Formal partnerships
  - -Accompaniment of organisations in the CHSSN network
  - -Mental health project in two parts:
    - -Relais-Pères (support for vulnerable fathers)
    - -Immigrant fathers project (adaptation of practices)

## **Surveys - some highlights**

### SOM 2018 survey on men's demand for help

(2095 Quebec men, including 269 English-speaking men)

The first factor in the choice of a psychosocial counsellor for Englishspeaking men is that the counsellor speaks English. For Francophones, the first factors are continuity and speed of service.

Statement	Anglos	Francos
Less likely to consult health professionals other than a doctor	61 %	74 %
More willing to leave messages on voicemail	47 %	31 %
More likely to consult a psychosocial worker in the community	6 %	2 %

## SOM April 2020 survey on co-parenting

(2115 fathers and mothers in Quebec, including 228 English-speaking fathers and 221 English-speaking mothers at the start of the pandemic)

Statement on fathers	Anglos	Francos
More likely to perceive that the pandemic has had a significant impact on co-parenting	65 %	50 %
More likely to consider it very important to team up with the other parent	84 %	<b>75</b> %
Less likely to find it difficult to have a good relationship	7 %	14 %
More likely to find it difficult to raise children well	25 %	14 %
More likely to find it difficult to know if they are doing the right thing with children	65 %	34 %

## January 2021 survey on men and the pandemic

(2740 men of whom 392 were English-speaking)

Statement	Anglos	Francos
Index of high psychological distress	22 %	12 %
Negative impact on daily life	74 %	66 %
Negative impact on mental health	48 %	38 %
Difficulty in adapting to changes linked to the health crisis	50 %	40 %
Less likely to consult a doctor in a medical clinic	58 %	<b>75</b> %

### SOM 2022 survey on fathers' vulnerabilities

(2119 Quebec fathers including 400 English-speaking fathers)

Statement	Anglos	Set
Index of high psychological distress	19 %	13 %
Suicidal ideations	11 %	7 %
Anxiety and distress (always or often)	36 %	26 %
Childhood sexual abuse	16 %	9 %

## Key findings on the vulnerabilities of Englishspeaking men and fathers in Quebec

- 1) There are many particularities in the way English-speaking men and fathers experience their vulnerabilities
- 2) Language is the primary factor that facilitates psychosocial counselling for English-speaking men
- 3) Culture also plays an important role in the way men's and fathers' vulnerabilities are constructed (cultural realities, relationship to services, masculinity, fatherhood, etc.)
- 4) The effects of the unfavourable socio-economic conditions in which many Englishspeaking men live should not be underestimated
- 5) All of these elements justify an adapted intervention to support English-speaking men

## Intervention approach (source: Jacques Roy)

- 1) Language: Language is a key issue, as it is the main barrier to accessing services and is subject to considerable disparities across Quebec.
- **2) Culture:** Beyond language, the culture of the Anglo-Saxon mentality and the diversity of diversity of cultures among English-speaking allophones also greatly influences the the English-speaking community's relationship to services.
- 3) Socio-economic dimension: This is an important component to consider because of the particular vulnerabilities of men in the English-speaking community.
- **4) Masculinities:** Understanding of gender roles and relationship to services is influenced by the different forms of masculinity found among English-speaking men.
- **5) Fatherhood:** It is also important not to overlook the diversity of values and symbolic representations of fatherhood within the different cultures that make up the English-speaking community.

#### **Action points**

- 1) Continue and intensify RVP-CHSSN partnerships (support for organisations, creation of tools, mental health projects, translation of documents, etc.)
- 2) Continue research to better understand the realities of English-speaking men and fathers
- 3) Sensitize and mobilize men's health and well-being respondents to the realities of English-speaking men within the CIUSSS and CISSS
- 4) Sensitize and mobilize respondents to English-speaking communities within CIUSSS and CISSS
- 5) Perhaps... sensitize the Secretariat for Relations with English-speaking Quebecers...

# The fatherhood reflex (a short four-step test on the inclusion of fathers in public policies)

Public policies = policies, strategies, laws, programs, action plans, frame of reference, etc.

- 1) The vocabulary
- 2) Objectives
- 3) Means of implementation (outcome indicators, forms, etc.)
- 4) The effects (do we actually reach the fathers?)

#### Conclusion

The realities of men and fatherhood are often a blind spot in psychosocial interventions in Quebec. And English-speaking men, like immigrant men, are in the blind spot... of the blind spot.

So they are often rather... invisible...

It is up to us to make them visible for their own well-being, but also for that of the children and spouses who share their daily lives.
