# Socio-demographic Profiles of Children aged 0-5 and their Parents

#### Introduction

### Early Child Development as a Social Determinant of Health

Early child development (ECD) is a cornerstone of human development and childhood is considered to be the most important developmental phase of the individual lifespan. The developmental outcomes of this early phase of life impact the level of health and well-being enjoyed by a population in its future. Early child development is a social determinant of the health of communities and it is a process that is particularly sensitive to social determinants like the socio-economic status of families with children aged 0-5 and their social environment, access to health and social services, communication competency and literacy and access to local social support networks.

Health organizations around the globe are promoting knowledge and fostering policy, programs and initiatives that aim to improve the situation of children experiencing disadvantaged conditions and who are thereby vulnerable to poor childhood development. In Québec, the 2017 study of the Institut de la statistique du Québec entitled *Québec Survey on Children's Development in Kindergarten/Enquete québécoise sur le development des enfants a la maternelle* selected the following key areas for assessment of the quality of ECD: physical health and well-being; social competence; emotional maturity; cognitive and language development; as well as communication skills and general knowledge.

CHSSN financially supports 23 local or regional community health and social services network organizations who mobilize citizens and multi-sectorial partners in all regions of Québec using a population health approach. They collectively address health determinants such as access to health services, healthy child development, education and literacy, and social environments or support networks. With their networks, CHSSN has developed a collective vision and an early childhood framework called *Bright Beginnings: an adapted approach to supporting English-speaking children (0-5) and families.* This approach is being implemented by networks to varying degrees in many regions in accordance with each network organization's capacity.

#### About These Profiles

These profiles draw from the 2021 Census of Canada to provide pertinent socio-demographic information on the children aged 0-5 of Québec's English-speaking communities and their families in accordance with Québec's RTS (réseau territorial de services) territories. They include information on their numbers, where

they live, family structures they are part of, socio-economic issues they face, their status as recent immigrants to Québec, aboriginal identity and their likelihood to be members of a visible minority. Each regional profile includes tables, graphs and information bullets that provide provincial and regional statistics for selected characteristics as well as comparisons between French-speaking majority and English-speaking minority populations within these administrative territories.

Please note that these profiles draw from two different census samples. Section 1 of each profile provides information drawn from the 2021 census sample of the Québec population living in private households. Section 2 provides information on the 2021 census sample of parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5 living in census families in Québec.

### **Definitions and Concepts**

These profiles draw data from the Statistics Canada 2021 Census of Canada and are organized in accordance with its definitions and concepts. The census dictionary is available at, https://www12.statcan.gc.ca/census-recensement/2016/ref/dict/index-eng.cfm

<u>First Official Language Spoken (FOLS)</u> The definitions of first official language spoken and official language minority are outlined in the Official Languages (Communications with and Services to the Public) Regulations issued pursuant to the Official Languages Act (1988). The official language minority is English in Québec and French in all other provinces and territories. First Official Language Spoken is derived from the census questions on knowledge of official languages, mother tongue and home language. Multiple responses are distributed equally among declared languages.

<u>Census Family households</u> are those with a married couple (with or without children), or a couple living common-law (with or without children), or a lone parent living with one or more children (lone-parent family).

<u>Census family</u> is defined as a married couple and the children, if any, of either and/or both spouses; a couple living common law and the children, if any, of either and/or both partners; or a lone parent of any marital status with at least one child living in the same dwelling and that child or those children. All members of a particular census family live in the same dwelling. A couple may be of opposite or same sex. Children may be children by birth, marriage, common-law union or adoption regardless of their age or marital status as long as they live in the dwelling and do not have their own married spouse, common-law partner or child living in the dwelling. Grandchildren living with their grandparent(s) but with no parents present also constitute a census family.

<u>Private household</u> refers to a person or group of persons who occupy the same dwelling and do not have a usual place of residence elsewhere in Canada or abroad. For census purposes, households are classified into three groups: private households, collective households and households outside Canada. Unless otherwise specified, all data in census products are for private households only.

<u>Educational Attainment</u> – Persons with low educational attainment are those with only a high school graduation certificate or less while those with high educational attainment are those with a university bachelor's degree or higher.

<u>Income</u> – Persons with low income are those with individual after-tax income less than \$20k while those with high income reported \$50k or more. This includes income from all sources.

<u>LICO</u> uses the income levels of a given family and considers how large a share of its income is spent on necessities such as food, shelter and clothing. If the amount a family spends is 20% higher than an average family in a year, it falls into the low-income cut-off category. People who live below income cut-offs may be said to live in "straitened circumstances." (Human Resources and Skills Development Canada, August 2009.) LICO Before-Tax (LICO-BT) is used in findings

drawn from the 2021 census sample drawing on the Quebec population in private households. LICO-After Tax (LICO-AT) is used in findings drawn from the 2021 census sample of parents with at least one child 0-5 living in census families in Quebec. (See Data Source below for sample explanation).

<u>Mobility status</u> – (Place of residence 5 years ago) Refers to the status of a person with regard to the place of residence on the reference day, May 10, 2021, in relation to the place of residence on the same date five years earlier.

- -Persons who have not moved are referred to as non-movers and persons who have moved from one residence to another are referred to as movers.
- -Movers include non-migrants and migrants.
- -Non-migrants are persons who did move but remained in the same city, town, township, village or Indian reserve.
- -Migrants include internal migrants who moved to a different city, town, township, village or Indian reserve within Canada.
- -External migrants include persons who lived outside Canada at the earlier reference date. External migrants are referred to as immigrants in this document.

### Methodological Notes

#### Data Source

These profiles draw information from datasets developed by the Community Health and Social Services Network (CHSSN) using the 2021 Census of Canada. Findings are provided for Québec's RTS territories in which there are at least 250 English speaking residents. **Please note that the profiles are divided into two sections. Section 1** provides information drawn from the 2021 census sample of the Québec population living in private households. **Section 2** provides information on the 2021 census sample of parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5 living in census families in Québec.


#### *Linguistic definitions*

There are numerous linguistic definitions that are used to identify the English-speaking population in Québec. The choice of linguistic indicator depends largely on the issue being examined. These profiles use the First Official Language Spoken (FOLS) definition with multiple responses proportionally distributed since it best reflects the total English-speaking health service users in the province. First Official Language Spoken is derived from three census questions: knowledge of official languages, mother tongue and home language. Dual responses are divided equally among English-speaking and French-speaking groups. Other definitions include Mother tongue which refers to the first language learned at home in childhood and still understood. The language most often spoken at home is used to designate the home language. Knowledge of official languages indicates the official language in which a person can carry on a conversation. The language used most often at work indicates the language spoken most frequently at work.





# Number of English Children 0 to 5 Across Québec



- There are 71, 730 English-speaking children aged 0 to 5 living in Quebec, and they represent 5.8% of the total English-speaking population.
- The number of English-speaking children aged 0-5 ranges from close to 36,000 among the five RTS regions of Montreal and 12,545 among the RTS of Montérégie to 30 children in des Iles, 85 in Bas-Saint-Laurent and 125 in Saguenay- Lac-Saint-Jean.

### Proportion of Children 0 to 5 Across Québec



- English-speaking children aged 0 to 5 years of age represent 5.8% of Quebec's English-speaking population.
- The proportion represented by children 0 to 5 varies by region ranging from 3.8% in Chaudiere-Appalaches to 8.3% in Nord-du-Quebec and 7.3% in Montérégie-Ouest.



- In 2021, there were 95,110 English-speaking persons in RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal. Of these, 4,290 (4.5%) were in the 0 to 5 age group.
- The proportion of children aged 0 to 5 in the Englishspeaking population was lower than that of Frenchspeaking population (5.1%).
- The proportion of children aged 0 to 5 in the Englishspeaking population of RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal was much lower than the average for Quebec's English-speaking population (5.8%).



- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal there were 4,290
   English-speaking children aged 0 to 5. Of these children, 1,745
   (40.7%) were members of a visible minority. This proportion was much higher than that displayed by the French-speaking population (26.3%).
- In 2021, the proportion of English-speaking children aged 0 to 5 who were members of a visible minority was similar to that of the total English-speaking population of RTS du Centre-Sudde-l'Île-de-Montréal (39.4%).
- For the overall English-speaking population of RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, there were 37,435 persons who were members of a visible minority, representing 39.4% of that population. The level for RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal is higher than the provincial average (35.9%).





- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal there were 4,290 English-speaking children aged 0 to 5. Of these children, 95 (2.2%) reported an Indigenous identity. This proportion was much higher than that displayed by the French-speaking population (1.3%).
- In 2021, the proportion of English-speaking children aged 0 to 5 who reported an Indigenous identity was much higher than that of the total English-speaking population of Québec (1.5%).
- For the overall English-speaking population of RTS du Centre-Sudde-l'Île-de-Montréal, there were 1,410 persons who reported an Indigenous identity, representing 1.5% of that population. The level for RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal is much lower than the provincial average (4.0%).



- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal there were 4,290 English-speaking children aged 0 to 5. Of these children, 600 (14.0%) were in lone parent families. This proportion was lower than that displayed by the French-speaking population (13.9%).
- In 2021, the proportion of English-speaking children aged 0 to 5 who were in lone parent families was much higher than that of the total English-speaking population of RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal (9.1%).
- For the overall English-speaking population of RTS du Centre-Sudde-l'Île-de-Montréal, there were 8,700 persons in lone parent families, representing 9.1% of that population. The level for RTS du Centre-Sudde-l'Île-de-Montréal is much lower than the provincial average (12.1%).



- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal there were 4,285
   English-speaking children aged 0 to 5. Of these children, 470
   (11.0%) were living below LICO. This proportion was much higher than that displayed by the French-speaking population (8.8%).
- In 2021, the proportion of English-speaking children aged 0 to 5 who were living below LICO was much lower than that of the total English-speaking population of RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Îlede-Montréal (21.7%).
- For the overall English-speaking population of RTS du Centre-Sudde-l'Île-de-Montréal, there were 20,660 persons who were living below LICO, representing 21.7% of that population. The level for RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal is much higher than the provincial average (12.1%).







- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 1.9% of parents with children aged 0 to 5 were between the ages of 15 and 24. Within English-speaking couples, 2.3% of parents with young children were within this age group, which was much higher than the proportion within French-speaking couples (1.1%) and higher than the overall average
- Among parents with children aged 0 to 5 in English-speaking couples, 30.4% were between the ages of 25 and 34. This was lower than the proportion for French-speaking couples (32.3%).
- Among parents with children aged 0 to 5 in English-speaking couples, 58.7% were between the ages of 35 and 44. This was similar to the proportion for French-speaking couples (58.5%).
- Among parents with children aged 0 to 5, the majority (89.4%) were between the ages of 25 and 44. Within English-speaking couples, 89.1% were within this age category, which was similar to the proportion for French-speaking couples (90.8%) and similar to the overall average.
- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 8.6% of parents with children aged 0 to 5 were 45 years of age or older. Within English-speaking couples, 8.5% of parents with young children were within this age group, which was similar to the proportion within French-speaking couples (8.2%) and similar to the overall average.




- Among English-speaking lone parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5, 7.8% were between the ages of 15 and 24. This was similar to the proportion among French-speaking lone parents (7.5%).
- Among English-speaking lone parents with children aged 0 to 5, 28.9% were between the ages of 25 and 34. This was lower than the proportion among French-speaking lone parents (34.3%).
- Among English-speaking lone parents with children aged 0 to 5, 55.6% were between the ages of 35 and 44. This was higher than the proportion among French-speaking lone parents (48.0%).
- A large majority of parents with young children fall within the combined age group of 25 to 44. Among English-speaking lone parents with children aged 0 to 5, approximately 84.4% were between the ages of 25 and 44. This was similar to the proportion for French-speaking lone parents (82.3%).
- In Québec, 7.8% of English-speaking lone parents with young children (0 to 5) were 45 years old or older. This was lower than the proportion among French-speaking lone parents with young children (9.1%).



- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 75.5% of all parents with children 0 to 5 had a single child within that age range. Among those parents in an English-speaking couple, 75.6% had a single child aged 0 to 5, which was similar to the proportion within French-speaking couples (75.0%) and similar to the overall average.
- Among parents in English-speaking couples with children aged 0 to 5, 21.0% had two children within that age range, which was similar to the proportion among French-speaking couples (23.0%).
- Among parents in English-speaking couples with children aged 0 to 5, 3.2% had three or more children within that age range, which was much higher than the proportion among French-speaking couples (2.0%).

### Lone Parents by Number of Children Aged 0 to 5




- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 90.0% of Englishspeaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 had a single child in that age group, which was higher than the proportion within French-speaking lone parents (82.3%).
- Among parents in English-speaking lone parents with children aged 0 to 5, 7.8% had two children within that age range, which was much lower than the proportion among French-speaking couples (15.7%).


- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 30.5% of parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5 were members of a visible minority in 2021.
- Among those parents in English-speaking couples, 40.5% were members of a visible minority, which was much higher than those in French-speaking couples (21.2%).
- Within mixed couples, those with one English-speaking parent and one French-speaking parent, 24.1% parents with children 0 to 5 were members of a visible minority. This was much lower than the proportion in English-speaking couples and higher than the proportion in French-speaking couples.
- Among English-speaking lone parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5, 43.3% were a member of a visible minority. This was much higher than the proportion of French-speaking lone parents (33.1%). English-speaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 were more likely to report being a member of a visible minority than were parents with children of that age in English-speaking couples.




- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 15.9% of parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5 were recent immigrants in 2021.
- Among those parents in English-speaking couples, 21.5% were recent immigrants, which was much higher than those in French-speaking couples (13.4%).
- Within mixed couples, those with one English-speaking parent and one French-speaking parent, 11.7% of parents with children 0 to 5 were recent immigrants. This was much lower than the proportion in English-speaking couples and lower than the proportion in French-speaking couples.
- Among English-speaking lone parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5, 13.6% were a recent immigrant. This was much higher than the proportion of
  French-speaking lone parents (6.7%). English-speaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 were less likely to report being a recent immigrant than were
  parents with children of that age in English-speaking couples.




- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 13.6% of parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5 reported a high school diploma as their highest level of educational attainment in 2021.
- Among those parents in English-speaking couples, 16.4% reported a high school diploma as their highest level of educational attainment, which was much higher than those in French-speaking couples (9.6%).
- Within mixed couples, those with one English-speaking parent and one French-speaking parent, 10.1% of parents with children 0 to 5 reported a high school diploma as their highest level of educational attainment. This was much lower than the proportion in English-speaking couples and higher than the proportion in French-speaking couples.
- Among English-speaking lone parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5, 35.6% reported a high school diploma as their highest level of educational attainment. This was higher than the proportion of French-speaking lone parents (31.5%). English-speaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 were less likely to report this low level of educational attainment than were parents with children of that age in English-speaking couples.

#### Apprenticeship and Trades Certificate



- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 5.8% of parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5 reported an apprenticeship or trades certificate as their highest level of educational attainment in 2021.
- Among those parents in English-speaking couples, 3.6% reported an apprenticeship or trades certificate as their highest level of educational attainment, which was much lower than those in French-speaking couples (6.5%).
- Within mixed couples, those with one English-speaking parent and one French-speaking parent, 5.3% of parents with children 0 to 5 reported an apprenticeship or trades certificate as their highest level of educational attainment. This was much higher than the proportion in English-speaking couples and lower than the proportion in French-speaking couples.
- Among English-speaking lone parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5, 7.8% reported an apprenticeship or trades certificate as their highest level of
  educational attainment. This was much lower than the proportion of French-speaking lone parents (14.6%). English-speaking lone parents with children
  0 to 5 were less likely to have an apprenticeship or trades certificate than were parents with children of that age in English-speaking couples.

#### High Educational Attainment




- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 65.9% of parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5 reported having a university BA or higher in 2021.
- Among those parents in English-speaking couples, 67.2% reported having a university BA or higher, which was similar to those in French-speaking couples (68.9%).
- Within mixed couples, those with one English-speaking parent and one French-speaking parent, 69.1% of parents with children 0 to 5 reported having a university BA or higher. This was similar to the proportion in English-speaking couples and similar to the proportion in French-speaking couples.
- Among English-speaking lone parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5, 35.6% reported having a university BA or higher. This was similar to the proportion of French-speaking lone parents (37.4%). English-speaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 were less likely to report reported having a university BA or higher than were parents with children of that age in English-speaking couples.



#### Out of the Labour Force



- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 15.3% of parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5 were out of the labour force in 2021.
- Among those parents in English-speaking couples, 19.3% were out of the labour force, which was much higher than those in French-speaking couples (10.2%).
- Within mixed couples, those with one English-speaking parent and one French-speaking parent, 10.9% of parents with children 0 to 5 were out of the labour force. This was much lower than the proportion in English-speaking couples and higher than the proportion in French-speaking couples.
- Among English-speaking lone parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5, 42.2% were out of the labour force. This was much higher than the proportion of French-speaking lone parents (32.3%). English-speaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 were less likely to be out of the labour force than were parents with children of that age in English-speaking couples.

#### **Unemployment Rate**




- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 7.9% of parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5 were unemployed in 2021.
- Among those parents in English-speaking couples, 11.9% were unemployed, which was much higher than those in French-speaking couples (5.1%).
- Within mixed couples, those with one English-speaking parent and one French-speaking parent, 6.9% of parents with children 0 to 5 were unemployed. This was much lower than the proportion in English-speaking couples and much higher than the proportion in French-speaking couples.
- Among English-speaking lone parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5, 17.3% were unemployed. This was much higher than the proportion of French-speaking lone parents (10.5%). English-speaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 were less likely to be unemployed than were parents with children of that age in English-speaking couples.



- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 12.7% of parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5 earned an after-tax income below \$20,000 in 2021.
- Among those parents in English-speaking couples, 16.6% earned an after-tax income below \$20,000, which was much higher than those in French-speaking couples (9.9%).
- Within mixed couples, those with one English-speaking parent and one French-speaking parent, 13.8% of parents with children 0 to 5 earned an after-tax income below \$20,000. This was lower than the proportion in English-speaking couples and much higher than the proportion in French-speaking couples.
- Among English-speaking lone parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5, 16.7% earned an after-tax income below \$20,000. This was much higher than the proportion of French-speaking lone parents (7.1%). English-speaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 were less likely to earn an income under \$20,000 than were parents with children of that age in English-speaking couples.



- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 48.0% of parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5 earned \$50,000 or more in 2021.
- Among those parents in English-speaking couples, 43.5% earned \$50,000 or more, which was lower than those in French-speaking couples (52.5%).
- Within mixed couples, those with one English-speaking parent and one French-speaking parent, 51.9% of parents with children 0 to 5 earned \$50,000 or more. This was higher than the proportion in English-speaking couples and similar to the proportion in French-speaking couples.
- Among English-speaking lone parents with at least one child aged 0 to 5, 34.4% earned \$50,000 or more. This was lower than the proportion of French-speaking lone parents (41.7%). English-speaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 were less likely earn an income of \$50,000 or more than were parents with children of that age in English-speaking couples.





English-speaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 were less likely to report living below LICO than were parents with children of that age in English-speaking couples.



- Among parents aged 15 to 25 with at least one child aged 0 to 5, of those in English-speaking couples were living below LICO, which was much higher than the proportion among those in French-speaking couples (-).
- Among parents aged 25 to 35 with at least one child aged 0 to 5, 10.5% of those in English-speaking couples were living below LICO, which was much higher than the proportion among those in French-speaking couples (4.5%).
- Among parents aged 35 to 45 with at least one child aged 0 to 5, 5.6% of those in English-speaking couples were living below LICO, which was much higher than the proportion among those in French-speaking couples (2.4%).
- Among parents aged 45 years and over with at least one child aged 0 to 5, 10.5% of those in English-speaking couples were living below LICO, which was much higher than the proportion among those in French-speaking couples (3.2%).




- Among English-speaking lone parents aged 25 to 35 with children 0 to 5, 40.7% were living below LICO, which was much higher than the proportion among French-speaking lone parents aged 25 to 35 (21.8%).
- Among English-speaking lone parents aged 35 to 45 with children 0 to 5, 12.2% were living below LICO, which was lower than the proportion among French-speaking lone parents aged 35 to 45 (14.6%).



- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 6.6% of parents in English-speaking couples with a single child aged 0 to 5 reported living below LICO. This was much higher than the proportion among those in French-speaking couples (3.2%).
- Among English-speaking couples with two children aged 0 to 5, 11.5% were living below LICO, which was much higher than the proportion among those in French-speaking couples (3.5%).

Lone Parents Living Below LICO, by Number of Children 0 to 5




- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal there were 3,725 parents of children 0 to 5 who had immigrated to Canada between 2016 and 2021. Of those parents in English-speaking couples, 21.2% were living below the Low-Income Cut-Off (LICO). This was much higher than the proportion among those in French-speaking couples (11.9%).
- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 54.5% of English-speaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 who were recent immigrants lived below LICO. This was much higher than the proportion among French-speaking lone parents (37.5%).
- Among parents with children 0 to 5 who were not recent migrants, 14.6% of those in an English-speaking couple were living below LICO, which was much higher than the proportion among those in French-speaking couples (9.0%).
- Among English-speaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 who were not recent migrants, 37.5% lived below LICO. This was similar to the proportion among French-speaking lone parents (36.1%).

- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal there were 7,210 parents of children 0 to 5 who reported being a member of a visible minority. Of those parents in English-speaking couples, 10.1% were living below the Low-Income Cut-Off (LICO). This was much higher than the proportion among those in French-speaking couples (6.4%).
- In RTS du Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal, 34.1% of English-speaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 who were a member of a visible minority lived below LICO. This was much higher than the proportion among French-speaking lone parents (25.3%).
- Among parents with children 0 to 5 who were not a member of a visible minority, 5.9% of those in an English-speaking couple were living below LICO, which was much higher than the proportion among those in French-speaking couples (2.4%).
- Among English-speaking lone parents with children 0 to 5 who were not a member of a visible minority, 17.6% lived below LICO. This was higher than the proportion among French-speaking lone parents (15.8%).
